Dear Families,

I am immensely proud of our teachers and students for their serious approach and dedication to our return to campus this year. They have worked hard to meet the needs of our on-campus and remote learning students. Based on the feedback I've received from the teachers in the Lower School, our girls still love to learn, they love to be together and have continued to do so at a meaningful pace. That said, we know that no classroom is a monolith, and we know that we all learn differently. We are committed to ensuring that all students are well prepared for the upcoming school year. Toward that end, we compiled a supplemental reading and math skills review that will boost the readiness and/or enrich the learning experience for all of our students.

We ask that you give your daughters a break before beginning any summer reading and math review. This year the combination of online and on-campus learning experiences demanded a very different level of energy, stamina, and focus. This experience gave way to fatigue and weariness. Your daughters need time away from their devices and time to play, relax and enjoy the summer.

The summer reading assignments are required. The summer reading lists are contained inside and your daughters will be required to read the listed books for her grade level. For math, we have put together a "menu" of options from which you can choose. Your daughter will be receiving a Math Review book called Summer Math Skills Sharpener. She will receive the grade level that she currently completed (for example, if your daughter just completed 3rd grade, she will receive the grade 3 review book). There are adaptive options (DreamBox Math), fact review options, games, puzzles, and much more. We <u>highly</u> recommend working in the Summer Math Skills Sharpener four days per week (no longer than 20 min). We also recommend doing BedTime Math and/or other math activities that require your daughter to stretch her math mind, problem-solving, and thinking skills.

For summer math, we are asking students to enjoy a variety of options.

Summer Skills Sharpener Allows students to review and strengthen their math skills over the summer in a workbook format. Students are recommended to use the book 3-4 times a week for about 20 minutes a day over a 10 week period. The books contain tutorial pages and resources to help the students and parents as they work through various problems. We will provide the books for the students.

BEDTIME MATH, WHICH IS A DAILY SERIES OF FUN MATH STORIES AND PROBLEM-SOLVING QUESTIONS. EACH DAY, THE READER IS GIVEN A STORY AND THEN A RANGE OF DIFFERENTIATED QUESTIONS. HERE IS MORE INFORMATION ABOUT THE BENEFITS OF BEDTIME MATH. YOU MAY PURCHASE THE THREE BOOKS ONLINE (HERE) OR DOWNLOAD THE FREE APP AND RECEIVE THE MATH PROBLEMS ON YOUR PHONE. BEFORE YOUR DAUGHTER COMES BACK TO SCHOOL, SHE SHOULD WRITE HER OWN BEDTIME MATH STORY AND QUESTIONS TO SHARE WITH HER CLASS.

DREAMBOX IS AN ONLINE SOFTWARE PROVIDER THAT FOCUSES ON IMPROVING MATH PROBLEM SOLVING AND CRITICAL THINKING SKILLS AND DEVELOPING NUMBER SENSE. STUDENTS WILL LOGIN IN BY CLICKING THEIR PREVIOUS GRADE LEVEL. UPCOMING KINDERGARTEN AND IST-GRADE STUDENTS WILL NOT HAVE ACCESS TO DREAMBOX UNTIL THE FALL.
