"A compelling, sometimes emotional nonfiction story of a 2013 assault in Oakland, California, when an African-American public-school teen boy named Richard set fire to a sleeping, gender-nonconforming white private school teen named Sasha on that bus. The story follows Sasha's recovery and Richard's subsequent trial and punishment, as well as their back stories. The story is thought-provoking and provides great discussion points about gender, racism, and the criminal justice system."

"Klara and the Sun, is narrated by...an AF, or Artificial Friend, a humanoid robot designed as a companion for children. When the novel opens, Klara is in a store full of other AFs, gleaning what she can about the human world from the window, like a goldfish whose whole world is one room. Egoless and naive, Klara believes that her mission is to make her eventual owner happy, and so she has to find out everything she can about human feelings." *NPR*
